
NETWORKING SESSION - Zoom Expo Floor

Joining Zoom Event

- Make sure your Zoom application is fully updated
- Make sure you are logged in with the appropriate Zoom account (i.e. the email that you registered with)
- Aim to join ~5 minutes before the start to resolve any technical issues
- After you have registered for the event, you will receive a confirmation email
- Clicking View Ticket will take you to a screen with an option to Join Lobby (as shown below)





Zoom Event Lobby


The lobby homepage is shown below. The sidebar (highlighted in red) enables you to navigate between the different options



- Under the Sessions tab, you will see the two sessions we are running.


 Bookmarking the sessions will ensure that they show up in your Itinerary

CONNECTING TO ZOOM EVENT



Zoom Expo - Networking Session

- Zoom Expo is a platform that imitates a physical space in the virtual world (shown below)
- Upon joining the Expo Floor, you will be given a brief tutorial, and an opportunity to create your 'avatar'
- Moving around the Expo Floor is done with either the arrow keys, or by clicking where you want to move
- There is a proximity chat feature, where you will be able to send messages to nearby avatars (shown in the red box below)
- There is also a map of the Expo Floor (indicated below by the red arrow)








Zoom Expo - Networking Session Booths

- Booths are virtual spaces where you can talk face-to-face with people
- Move your avatar to a booth and click Enter Booth
- From here you will be able to join a meeting space
- To move to a different booth, return to the Expo Floor, move to the booth you want, and click Enter Booth again



Zoom Expo - Ending the Event

- You will see a countdown appear on your screen counting down to when the event is about to end.
- Once the event is over you will be brought back to the Lobby but you will have to manually 'X' out of Zoom to leave.
